

Welcome to the first edition of CONNECTing. The Care Management Entity (CME) program at Beacon Health Options is launching this quarterly newsletter to keep providers and families informed about community events, CONNECT grant activities, and the progress on our shared goal to integrate Connecticut's child-serving systems. We appreciate your input, feedback and collaboration.

WHAT IS CONNECT?

The Connecticut Network

of Care Transformation (CONNECT) is a statewide initiative to create a partnership between families, state agencies, and service providers at the local, regional and state levels to develop a "No Wrong Door" approach to the delivery of children's behavioral health care. The enhanced partnership supports children, youth, and families in accessing the services they need in a timely and effective manner through an integrated network of care. CONNECT has six statewide Transformation Teams: Family Engagement Team, Cultural and Linguistic Competency Development Team, Communication and Social Marketing, Network of Care Analysis, Data Integration, and Workforce Development.





CME trained in Motivational Interviewing

The CME team along with other Beacon Health staff were trained in Motivational Interviewing (MI) in November. Dr. Jonathan Fader is a licensed clinical psychologist and team psychologist for the NY Mets baseball team and is certified as a consultant by the Association for Applied Sport Psychology. Dr. Fader has over fifteen years of experience as a Motivational Interviewing trainer and has participated in the "Training for Trainers" program, making him part of the nationally recognized Motivational Interviewing Network of Trainers.

Motivational Interviewing, often referred to as MI, is an effective way of talking to people about making changes in their lives and will be incorporated into the services provided to the children and families served by the CME. MI helps staff gain an understanding of our members' perspectives on changes and the ambivalence that often accompanies change. This empathetic, collaborative and affirming approach can often facilitate a family's own reasons for change. Participants had very enthusiastic feedback on the trainer and the counseling approach.

The CONNECT Data Integration and Coordination Workgroup is working on developing a data dashboard that will integrate data from multiple state systems and will allow the user to view data by town or region. The workgroup met seven times in 2015 and, at years-end, its scope was expanded to become the "Statewide Data Integration Workgroup." Family Engagement Action Team (FEAT)

FEAT teams are youth and family leaders in our communities that work to ensure that child-serving systems are family-driven, youth-guided, and culturally and linguistically competent. These youth and family champions also guide statewide policy by providing input and sharing strategies for best serving the families in their communities.

Cultural and Linguistic Competency Development Team

This team is responsible for developing, planning, and implementing a statewide process for incorporating Enhanced Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (CLAS) Standards within the Network of Care in Connecticut. CLAS Standards are guidelines that inform, guide, and facilitate practices related to culturally and linguistically appropriate health services. Communication and Social Marketing Team

Social marketing focuses on changing awareness, attitudes, and behaviors as they relate to advancing social causes. Data Integration Team



The purpose of the Statewide Data Integration Team is to strengthen the process for collecting, integrating, and sharing data across child-serving sectors. The goal of this team is to make data more accessible, more collaborative, and more useful through a family-driven process to transform data integration at the state level. This forum

provides an opportunity for families, providers, and state agency partners to meet regularly to share and track data needs, strengths, gaps, and interests in building capacity for an integrated statewide system.



Workforce Development Team

The Workforce Development Team is responsible for the implementation of a training and mentoring program to promote the values of the Network of Care and the Wraparound model. The focus is on engaging family leaders and developing opportunities for them to share their knowledge and voices in the development of family-driven and youth-guided systems of care in Connecticut. Thus far, nearly 300 family members have been trained through the Agents of Transformation training with numerous upcoming trainings scheduled in the coming months.

Family leaders, FAVOR and CME staff attended a two-day, Persuasive Storytelling training held January 20-21, 2016. Stories help people connect with their audience on an emotional level. Stories convey key information in a way that is remembered and helps persuade an audience to take action. This is true for both spoken and written stories as well as the stories told with data. The training helped participants learn how to incorporate their personal stories in public speaking situations to help reduce stigma and increase awareness of children's mental health issues.





WHAT IS CONNECT?

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
"Helping Children and Youth Succeed" was the focus of a half-day event held on June 29th by the Department of Children and Families (DCF). Michael Williams, DCF Deputy Commissioner, and Tim Marshall, DCF Behavioral Health Clinical Manager,

welcomed DCF staff, family champions, CONNECT leadership, Intensive Care Coordination staff, and community leaders to discuss system development and statewide data initiatives. The presentations focused on the theme, "Where We Were, What We've Done, and Where We Are Going." Presenters included: Tyler Kleykamp, the Chief Data Officer of the Office of Policy Management; Michelle Riordan-Nold, the Director of the CT Data Collaborative; Knute Rotto, Chief Executive Officer for Beacon Health Options CT; and Mary Jo Meyers, Consultant for Wraparound among many other distinguished speakers.

CONNECT Transformation Teams: Family Engagement Action Team, Cultural and Linguistic Competency Development Team, Communication & Social Marketing, Network of Care Analysis, Data Integration, and Workforce Development.

Family Engagement Action Team (FEAT)

FEAT teams are in the statewide development process. FAVOR will be coordinating meetings with alumni of the Network of Care – Agents of Transformation training (NOC-AOT). The families will be meeting to discuss how they can impact system change. Additional training opportunities for families will include Persuasive Storytelling and Data 101. Trainings can be scheduled by contacting FAVOR, Inc. at 860-563-3232.



Cultural and Linguistic Competency Development Team

The Cultural and Linguistic Development Team is currently wrapping up the final phase of a six-month pilot with 12 agencies across the state. The agencies were asked to identify areas for improvement related to health disparities. A second phase, which will include 14 more agencies, will be starting in August. Based on the results, a workgroup of families and providers will be tasked with developing, planning, and implementing a statewide process for incorporating Enhanced Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (CLAS) Standards. The CLAS standards

Communication and Social Marketing Team

The Communication and Social Marketing Team played a vital role in organizing and coordinating a variety of



mental health awareness events during May which is designated as National Mental Health Awareness Month. The events increased awareness and reduced stigma about mental health. The activities are being submitted to the 2017 Excellence in Community Communications and Outreach (ECCO) Recognition Program along with SAMHSA's National Children's Mental Health Awareness Day 2016. In addition, this Team has been collaborating with the Data Integration and the Workforce Development teams on spreading the word about the CONNECT data portal and parent leadership trainings, respectively.

Network Analysis Team


The combined PA 13-178 and CONNECT Network Analysis workgroup supports the goal of gaining a better understanding of partners in the child-serving systems and how these systems coordinate and integrate their efforts. The workgroup has been concentrating on four groups of providers: behavioral health providers, pediatric/primary care providers, schools and families. Surveys have been developed for the behavioral health group which will be distributed regionally to the providers during the summer. A separate collaboration survey will be distributed to pediatric providers in August. A network analysis of the schools is in the planning phase. Family and consumer feedback is also an integral part of network analysis and there is a plan to host community forums to gain this valuable input.

Data Integration Team

The Statewide Data Integration Team went live with the CONNECT data dashboards website in May. The website will serve as a central data portal for a number of the child-serving systems. The CT Data Collaborative assisted in the technical development of this website. The Team now intends to explore additional data sets and opportunities for sharing during the next several months. Workforce Development Team

The Workforce Development Team is working on integrating the Data 101 and Persuasive Storytelling trainings with the Agents of Transformation training to create a Family Champion Curriculum. In addition, the Workforce Development Team is collaborating with the Cultural and Linguistic Competency Development Team to train

families on the CLAS Standards.

The families who are trained will be a resource for guiding the system towards cultural and linguistically appropriate care.



CONNECT was one of many sponsors for the Second Annual iCAN Conference held on September 22, 2016. The Consumer and Family Committee of the

CT Behavioral Health Partnership hosted the Conference which had as its theme,




Network Analysis Team

Legislation PA 13-178 and CONNECT Network Analysis workgroup supports the goal of gaining a better understanding of partners in the child-serving systems and how these systems coordinate and integrate their efforts. Surveys for behavioral health providers have been distributed statewide. The results are rolling in and will be available in early 2017. A separate collaboration survey for pediatric providers will be sent out soon. Community Forums are being scheduled statewide to gain family feedback and guidance on system development and change.

Data Integration Team

Child-serving state agencies participating in this workgroup continue to closely review the data they collect while also considering how soon they can make this data available to the general public. The Office of Policy and Management and FAVOR, Inc. came together in this unique collaboration to help families have increased access to data. Cathy Flippen is a wife, a mother, a motivational speaker, a television host producer, a trainer/facilitator and as she likes to say, "a woman with a PHD (Passion, Heart, and Desire)." With 30 years experience working in her community and 18 years as a foster parent, she has a great desire to help others. Cathy was introduced to the NOC-AOT training through FAVOR, Inc. She defines a family champion as one who "brings change into her community." She uses her experiences to empower families to make policy changes that will better serve society. After attending many meetings, she decided to start her own group called Destiny Outreach Support Group, which is held weekly on Tuesdays (6 p.m.to 8 p.m.) at the East Hartford Cultural Center at 50 Chapman Place, room 101, in East Hartford. In the future, she plans to introduce the NOC-AOT to community organizations, support groups, churches and even hopes to start NOC-AOT parties! Of the NOC-AOT training, she says, "It was a great experience and I look forward to help push the curriculum to the next level and develop new Family Champions in the community."








